Ski News

Vail Buys Heavenly, -

In a day of tumultuous activity, American Skiing Company (ASC) sold Heavenly Ski Resort to Vail Resorts (VR) for \$102 million, and canceled the long-delayed sale of Steamboat to Triple Peaks LLC. The Heavenly sale is expected to close within 30 to 90 days, pending antitrust and Forest Service approvals. The Heavenly purchase should enable ASC to continue its restructuring efforts to better achieve its goals for debt reduction.

Triple Peaks Files Suit-

Tim and **Diane Mueller** and Triple Peaks, LLC have filed suit in the United States District Court of Denver, CO, to wrest ownership of Steamboat Ski and Resort from American Skiing Co. (ASC). The suit follows ASC's decision on March 26 to cancel the sale of Steamboat.

The suit alleges that ASC unlawfully breached its binding agreement with the Muellers and Triple Peaks for the purchase of Steamboat. The closing, initially scheduled for March 14, was delayed at ASC's request until March 26. At the closing, though, the buyers were informed that ASC would not proceed with the sale, since they sold Heavenly Valley to Vail Resorts. ASC's negotiations with Vail had not been disclosed during the pendency of ASC's agreement with the Muellers and Triple Peaks.

Aspen to Require Helmets—

The Aspen Skiing Company put into effect a new rule requiring all ski school kids six and under to wear helmets for the rest of the season. The new rule was in place on March 23 and is the first of its kind at a major mountain resort. Aspen will watch closely for reaction as the company considers taking the rule one step farther by encompassing all kids 12 and under for next season.

Ski Patrollers Form Union-

The Denver Post reports that six pro ski patrol unions have agreed to join together in a national labor organization. Patrols at Aspen, Breckenridge, The Canyons, Crested Butte, Killington and Steamboat — about 500 patrollers in all — are already unionized. These patrols have formed the United Professional Ski Patrols of America. A national union is the first step in improving the working conditions of patrollers nationwide.

Mont Blanc Tunnel Re-Opens–

The Mont Blanc Tunnel between Chamonix in France and Courmayeur in Italy finally reopened in March. Passenger vehicles reentered the tunnel just under three years after it closed following the catastrophic fire which raged for two days and claimed 39 lives. The re-opening came after nearly six months of speculation of eminent reopening which at one time included the belief that it might happen before the start of the 2001/02 ski season.

Fitness-Improve Your Skiing This Summer

excerpted from The Professor, Stu Campbell, Ski magazine, May/June 2002

Have you ever watched the professionals ski? The best skiers show very little up and down movement, but spread their feet apart and smoothly roll both skis from edge to edge. There is no pivoting of the skis and rarely any skid—just arc-to-arc carving.

Balancing on inline skates is identical to standing over the sweet spot on a modern slalom ski. There is little margin for error. You can't be too far forward, and sitting back will put you down in a second.

Find a wide paved area with a gentle pitch. Try a local school. Set up some traffic cones and "run gates." Wear a helmet, knee and elbow pads and wrist

protectors, and "ski" this slope all summer. The more miles you skate, the more ready you'll be to make precise turns and impress your friends next season.

Test Your Ski Safety

Question— Skiers should aim for a lunch that is:

- a. high in carbohydrates and low in fat to boost bloodsugar levels.
- b. a mix of carbohydrates and protein.
- c. high in protein for sustained energy.
- d. Lunch? Who thinks about lunch on a powder day?

Answer—

Forget the Atkins protein-only diet. Skiers need loads of carbohydrates, which the body burns quickly and easily, to stay alert on those double black-diamond slopes. But you also need protein for sustained energy. And never skip meals; your blood sugar will drop, leaving you susceptible to injuries that will keep you off the slopes. Answer is b.

Skiing 2003 Sestriere, Italy

Sestriere was built for skiing, with high, north-west facing slopes. The resort's international profile was raised in 1997 when they hosted the World Cup Championships, but that's nothing compared with the coming 2006 Olympics.

Sestriere is at one extreme of the big Franco-Italian Milky Way area. The local slopes have two main sectors—Sises, directly in front of the village, and the more varied Motta, above Borgata to the north-east and 720 feet higher.



Chairlifts predominate on the local north-west facing slopes. Access to Sansicario and the rest of the Milky Way is via the gondola from Borgata to Col Basset, at the top of the Sauze d'Oulx area, and a drag-lift back to the Monte Fraiteve.

With most of the local slopes facing north-west and ranging from 6,000 feet to 9,000 feet, snow cover is reliable for most of the season, even without the snowmaking that covers practically all of the Sises sector and half of Motta.

There is a fair amount to amuse experts — steep pistes served by the drags at the top of both sectors, and off-piste opportunities in several directions from Sestriere to Monte Fraiteve. Both sectors offer plenty for intermediates, who can explore practically all of the Milky Way. The terrain is excellent for beginners as there are several green runs down to Borgata.

SNOWBOARD STRIP

Taos Allows Snowboarding for One Day

For a single day the slopes of Taos were "free" and skiers and snowboarders played happily together in the slush. The occasion was Employee day, the one day of the season when Taos Ski Valley allows snowboards on its slopes. Although the day was restricted to staff, plenty showed up ready to ride.

The forces for change aligned against the snowboard ban have never been stronger. Taos was down 20% this season while nearby Angel Fire, which has embraced snowboarding, had a close-to-record season, despite the poor snow. It's increasingly evident the snowboard ban is anti-family and destroys family business. Almost every business in Taos Ski Valley and most businesses in the town of Taos have now publicly stated their opposition to the ban. One indication of the changing attitudes is Chris Stagg, marketing director of Taos Ski Valley and former mayor, getting thumped in the recent election by an anti-ban business owner.
