

When it came time to break for lunch, there were limited options for the group, as there were not always wheelchairs available to them. Again, something that most of us never give a second thought to. The afternoons were much of the same, although I usually stopped skiing around 3:00.

I raced for the first time and finished two NASTAR runs on Thursday. And for some unknown reason, probably a clerical error, I got a bronze medal at the banquet on Friday night. My roommate Sherry (a Wailer), is an excellent skie, and also raced for the Unrecables and helped them win a respectable third place overall.

Throughout the trip I got called more "P" names then ever before, especially by my new friend **Ron Guidotti** (or was it Rob or Russell or Rufus?). So I became accustomed to answering to Priscilla, Princess, Pamela, etc., but my favorite was Petunia.

I want to thank all the Unrecables for welcoming me — Sigrid Noack, Barbara Miyamoto, Dee Armstrong, Kathy Paisley, Gordon Cardona, Wally Cardona, Daniel Palacios and Steve Lefkowitz.

For a final note, I encourage everyone who is reading this article who has not spent any time with Unrecables to try to do so. It will be a memorable experience and oodles of fun!

SAFETY: SAFETY TIPS

Ski helmets are a good idea. Make sure the helmet fits correctly. A ski helmet is not an item you buy to grow into. Educate yourself about the benefits and limitations of the helmet. Wearing a helmet doesn't give permission to ride faster or recklessly.

Dress in layers. Layering allows you to accommodate your body's constantly changing temperature. For example, dress in polypropylene underware (top and bottoms) which feels good next to the skin, dries quickly, absorbs sweat and keeps you warm. You should also wear a turtleneck, sweater and waterproof jacket.

Be prepared. Mother nature has a mind of her own. Wear a hat, 80 percent of heatloss is through the head.

Be sure to wear sun protection, even on cloudy days. The sun reflects off the snow and is stronger than you think!

Wear sunglasses or goggles. Skiing is a lot more fun when you can see. The sun can burn your eyeballs.

When buying outer skiwear, look for fabric that is water and wind-resistant. Look for

wind flaps to shield zippers, snug cuffs at wrists and ankles, collars that can be snuggled up to the chin and deep pockets. Buy quality products.

Put beginners in ski school to get them

on the right track. Instructors know how to teach skiing and snow-boarding, it's their business. Then you'll enjoy skiing with your friends and they will be



proud to show you their skiing abilities.

Be sure you have a trail map.

Knows when to stop skiing. For example, if you're chilled, injured, have a problem with equipment or even if you're just simply worn out. It's alright to stop before the end of the day.

Set a meeting place if you get separated from your group. The walkie talkies now available are convenient and a big hit on the slopes.

FWSA Ski History

California Ski Association—

The organization of skisport in California was to a large extent the result of an effort to attract the 1932 Winter Olympics. In spite of losing the Olympic bid in Yosemite, the National Ski Association (NSA) gave the sanction to the California State Chamber of Commerce to organize the California Ski Association (CSA).

October 7, 1930, "Hall of Famer" Wendell Robie of the Auburn Ski Club, organized strong club support to form the California Ski Association. At the NSA convention in Chicago, December 14, 1930, CSA was accepted as an affiliated division and California was awarded the 1932 National Ski tournament. The first sanctioned divisional meet was held by CSA in 1931.

January 18, 1931, CSA orchestrated a "traffic jam" demonstration that

resulted in the authorization by the State of California for snow removal equipment on the roads that accessed California's emerging ski resorts. Skiing was a new sport and thousands traveled to the snow in the winter. Ski Jumping was the daredevil sport of the period and ski clubs hosted huge spectator events. The ski industry began to develop from small club-operated hills to larger ski areas.

In 1946, the Area Development Committee was formed to concentrate on getting two ski areas approved — San Gorgonio and Mineral King. (Neither of which will ever be developed.)

At the Convention in 1948, CSA changed its name to the Far West Ski Association (FWSA) to have a name more representative of the geographical area it encompasses — California, Nevada and Hawaii.

Rahles Honored by USOC-

Downhiller **Daron Rahlves** (Sugar Bowl, CA), who conquered Kitzbühel's fabled Hahnenkamm downhill for the first victory in that race by an American skier in 44 years (**Buddy Werner** in 1959) and had two other top-3s in World Cup races, is the U.S. Olympic Committee's Male Athlete of the Month for January.

USOC officials said Rahlves was cited for his historic victory in Kitzbuehel, for finishing second in the Lauberhorn in Wengen, Switzerland, the previous weekend and for finishing third in a downhill in Bormio, Italy. Runnerup was tennis player **Andre Agassi**, who won the Australian Open.



Coincidentally, the USOC announce-

ment came as Rahlves was being honored in Kitzbuehel for his dramatic win by having his name painted on one of the resort's gondolas, an honor reserved only for winners of the famous Hahnenkamm, which is regarded by many as the Super Bowl of ski racing.

Big Sky-

Big Sky Resort is developing the north side of Lone Peak for the 2003/2004 ski season adding over 1,000 new acres to the resort. The new Moonlight expansion will include a 2 mile long, six passenger high speed lift accessing the new intermediate and advanced terrain.

Berthoud To Remove Lifts-

After almost 20 years of off-and-on operations, lift-served skiing has come to an end at Berthoud Pass. The area's two lifts are being removed this summer of 2003. The triple chair is going to a ski area near Kansas City and the quad chair to Berkshire East in Massachusetts.

Berthoud itself will continue to run as a boutique snowcat operation, as it has for the past two seasons.

No Sleigh? No Problem.

Imagine seeing 250 Santas ripping down Broadway at Sunday River. As part of a local fundraiser on December 20, 2002 the Maine resort provided free lift tickets to anyone dressed as St. Nick. Looked like fun.

Comeback of the Year-

There may have been more prestigious victories for Austrian superstar **Hermann Maier**, but none more meaningful than his January World Cup super G gold medal, won in front of the home crowd at Kitzbühel, Austria. The "Herminator" stepped onto the victor's podium 17 months after a life-threatening

motorcycle accident nearly cost him a leg.

Bode Breaks Free-

Making the Austrians nervous is a huge feat, but to be in the running for the overall World Cup title until the last race earns true respect. With Hermann Maier now 30 and Stephan Eberharter 34, 25-year-old Bode Miller can be called the best young skier in the world.



Fitness: Workout of A Champion

Eric Schloy-

Claim to fame: Ranked third overall in 2001 World Cup standings for GS; two World Cup podium finishes for 2001; Silver at 2003World Championships for GS.

Fit thought: "Skiing's an athletic sport, so I choose exercises that involve athleticism. The power clean hits all the major muscle groups, and it involves coordination and timing."



Targets: Total body, emphasis glutes, hamstrings, and shoulders.

How to: With the barbell on the floor, legs flexed, lift the bar in one motion to your thighs, bringing the shoulders back and chest out. From there, lift with your shoulders in a shrugging motion, bringing the bar up to your collarbone (see photo). Elbows should end up under the bar, out front.

Reps & sets: Start with just the barbell, and work your way up in weight as you get stronger. Build to 3 sets of 12, then add weight and drop the reps.

Erik's tip: Before you go to the gym, pop a ski video into the VCR to get fired up. "The Ski Team has highlight videos of winning runs playing in the gym. We lift because we have a goal in mind — we're lifting to win." ■




FUTURE OF CLUBS

Personally, I believe the future of ski clubs lies with the families. The future is not a snowboarder versus skier issue but one of age. Of the 6 million active skiers, a full third are under the age of 18. In this article, the term "skier" is meant in the generic sense and applies to any on-snow non-motorized winter sport like downhill, nordic, telemark, boarding, ski skating, biking, tubing, etc.

For the past 25 years, the amount of skier days has remained flat at about 50 millions. But we are not increasing the number of skiers, just the number of skier days. The 2000-01 season at 56.7 million skier days was the first growth we have seen in a long time. Even last year showed encouraging numbers in light of the third year in



a row of marginal snow experienced in Colorado. So where would new skiers (and potential club members) come from? The family?

The average age of a typical club member is mid 50s, Most of us joined our first club when we were in our 30s and everyone was about 10 years older or younger than

us. We are now in our 50s and 60s. If more than 30% of skiers are under age 18, shouldn't this be the group (along with their parents) we go after?

The 30 years olds today (x-generation) do not want to socialize with us. They have their own core group of friends they do "stuff" with. It's a loosely knit group that prefers to have the option of deciding where to go at the last minute. There are no commitments and no up-front costs.

Families are typically not welcome at many ski clubs. Families have different dynamics and needs from what most Ski (Social & Recreational) Clubs provide today. Families probably need their own club with the option to interact with us older folks.

There are still a few of us relics around that have the knowledge and expertise to organize families and help them form their own clubs and organizations. I would be more than willing to help. But in the meantime, remember children are always welcome on Pac Rim trips.

California bulldog **Andy Finch** (Fresno, CA) finished second, a full 4.2 points off Fisher, but after a win at Mount Bachelor, Finch was named the men's national freestyle champion. 2002 Olympian **Tommy Czeschin** (Mammoth Lakes, CA) was third with 38.1 points, also posting his first Grand Prix podium on the year.

Action from the U.S. Snowboard Finals Powered by Chevy Trucks will air April 15 at 4:00 p.m. EST on ESPN. ■
