BIG WHITE opening and closing



Powderhorn to be Auctioned

Western Colorado's **Powderhorn Ski Resort** will be offered for sale at auction on August 4, 2011. The resort, which consists of 44 trails and four lifts on 1,600 acres, is located on the Grand Mesas outside of Grand Junction.

There will be no reserves or minimums for the auction, and the highest bidder will own the resort and associated real estate upon completion of the auction. The ski area is for sale due to the retirement of owner **Steve Bailey**, who acts as CEO and president of the resort.

Bud Klien dies at 83

Bud Klien, founder of Kirkwood resort, died at the age of 83 after a battle with cancer. Klien, a number one draft pick for the Red Sox upon his graduation from Stanford in 1950, choose to return to California and help run his family's agricultural business rather than play ball. He switched to the snow industry in the early 1970s when he led a group of investors to develop Kirkwood. He owned the Robert Strong winery in

Sonoma and was the inventor of the "California wine cooler."

Breckenridge Peak 6 Expansion

The U.S. Forest Service has approved Breckenridge Ski Resort's Peak 6 expansion plan despite opposition from some environmental groups. The draft EIS would allow the area to add up to 550 acres of lift-served and hike-to terrain, a six-pack detachable chairlift, and a 150-seat lodge at the lift's mid-station.

Ski areas feel the heat of wildfires

Spiking temperatures kicked off the western wildfire season.

The Osha wildfire in northern New Mexico threatened the Sipapu Ski Area, forcing residents to evacuate the area.

In Colorado, crews faced down a fire less than ½ a mile from Keystone's boundary. The blaze, which burned less than 20 acres west of the ski area, was linked to a logging operation, although the cause has not been determined.

STILL SKIING in the west

This year is one for the record books.

Utah resorts have chalked up a nearrecord number of approximately 4.2 million skier day visits during the 2010-11 winter season. The number represents four-percent growth over the prior year, making this winter the second best in Utah. **Snowbird** is expected to remain open until July 4.

Near-record snowfall totals this winter, along with two feet of new snow over the past two weeks, has sparked California's **Sugar Bowl** to reopen for the July 4 holiday for 2010-11 and 2011-12 season passholders. Skiing will be available on the Disney lift only.

Else where in California, **Kirkwood** and **Alpine Meadows** will both be open for the Independence holiday, while nearby **Boreal** expects to be open to July 11-12. **Mammoth Mountain** is running lifts with a projected a closing date of July 4.

In Colorado, **Arapahoe Basin** has extended it's closing date until mid-June, with rumors swirling that the ski area might go for a July 4 closing.

In Washington, **Crystal Mountain** is expected to operate on weekends into June and perhaps July. The area has a good shot at a July closing, with new snow pushing the ski area's snowfall to 600 inches, a new record.

In Oregon, **Timberline**, is keeping the season alive. Summer operations on Mt. Hood's Palmer Glacier are part and parcel of the Timberline experience. This year Mt. Hood's summer season kicked off on May 31, with lifts operating daily from 8 AM to 2 PM.

Also kicking off the summer season is **Blackcomb**, which commenced summer operations on the Blackcomb glacier on May 30. ◆

Water Ski Safety

Water skiing is a great way to have fun while enjoying boating. That said, it's not an activity to be undertaken without preparation. It requires some special skills by the boat operator and the skier, an understanding of hand signals, and demands a lot of attention to safety by both parties.

Know the Code

A skier must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket that has a high impact rating designed for water skiing.

An observer is required whose only job is to watch the skier, receive signals and

alert the boat operator if the skier falls.

The water skier should enter the water and move away from the boat before the boat's engine is started.

Wait for the skier to signal that he or she is ready to go. Skier should yell "hit it."

Pay attention to what the other boaters are doing and don't jeopardize your skier's safety by pulling in front of other boats.

The skier should never wrap any part of the tow line around his or her body. It's also a good idea to take off all jewelry.

The skier should stay aware of and avoid surroundings and potential hazards.

After falling or dropping, the skier should hold a ski up out of the water while waiting to be retrieved, and if necessary waves his or her arms.

Even if not required by state laws, the observer should fly a red flag while the skier is down in the water.

When approaching a skier, always keep the skier in view and on the operator's side of the boat.

Always shut off the engine before allowing the skier to board the boat.

Retrieve the towline as soon as possible to avoid other boats from running over your rope. ◆

Coast Guard Considers Mandating Adult Life jacket

An advisory panel to the U.S. Coast Guard gave its go-ahead to pursue federal regulations that would require adults to wear life jackets on certain boats.

The National Boating Safety Advisory Council asked the Coast Guard to consider mandating that anyone aboard a boat less than 18 feet long be required to wear a life jacket when underway. In addition it asks that all those being towed in water sports, riding personal watercraft, or in human-powered boats of any length be required to wear life jackets as well.

The 16-5 decision mirrors a trend among

state boating agencies to increase the number of people actually wearing Coast Guard-approved life jackets with the aim of reducing boating fatalities.

Unlike the Council recommendation, which would apply to all ages, most state laws apply just to children and specify varying age cutoffs, typically 12 and under.

The U.S. Forest Service estimates that 82 million people participated in boating in 2010 and Coast Guard statistics show 736 people died in boating accidents that year.

According to a Coast Guard mathematical model, if a 70 percent wear rate was achieved, mandating boaters nationwide to wear life jackets in boats less than 18 feet could save 71 lives each year.

Seek sports that challenge you mentally and physically in skiing's off season, so you can enjoy skiing's on season with aplomb.

You can get into mountain ecology to learn more about the mountains you ski. One resort offering guests a view into local ecology is Whistler Blackcomb. Inline skating can meet most skiers' cross training needs. Add inline skates to a parking lot with a slight incline for a great place to repeat slalom turns. Moderately steep hills (and an

experienced skater) are great for hop turn practice. Or blaze down your local "rail-trail" to give your body and its most important muscle (the brain) a workout.

Whether on the road or down a mountainside, riding a bicycle can do many positive things for your mind and body, including the parts you use for skiing.

CRESTED BUTTE turns 50

Crested Butte revolutionize skiing with freeski and extremes competitions.

In the 1860s and 1870s coal and silver mines began to open in the Gunnison area, and many little mining towns formed. However, when silver mining hit on hard times, many of these towns failed. Crested Butte survived because it served as a supply town to the surrounding area.

When the coal mines closed, the town began to shrink, and eventually the local high school was closed. Students had to travel to Gunnison to go to high school. The town did not revive until a ski area was built on Mount Crested Butte in the 1960s.

Crested Butte Mountain Resort opened when **Fred Rice** and **Dick Eflin** purchased a ranch on Mt. Crested Butte. An operating permit enabling the resort to be built was approved by the United States Forest Service the following year.

In 1963, Crested Butte constructed a top-to-bottom gondola from the base area to near where the bottom of the High Lift is today. The three-person Silver Queen Gondola was notorious for being cramped and the cabins were known to have frequent collisions.

The gondola lasted until 1972, when a bubble double chairlift replaced it. Other opening lifts included a t-bar that serviced the training hill on Buckley.

A double chairlift called Twister was installed in 1969 to supplement the Silver Queen Gondola. The lift serviced expert and advanced trails on the west slope of the mountain.

In 1972, another double chairlift, Peachtree, was built at the base area to service a set of learning trails between Silver Queen and the t-bar area. Peachtree still operates today.

In 1979, the Teocalli double chairlift was installed on the north side of the mountain, providing access to some intermediate trails, and double chairlifts were also built servicing the Paradise Bowl, which opened intermediate trails to the east of Twister as well as the East River area below that.

In 1982, a triple chairlift running out of the base area called the Keystone lift was constructed to service beginner and low intermediate trails on the lower slopes of the mountain.

The following year, they expanded the mountain by constructing two additional triple chairlifts, Gold Link and Painter Boy, servicing beginner and intermediate terrain to the north of the main mountain.

In 1987, a platter lift servicing the North Face chutes above East River was installed.




CRESTED BUTTE today

Known for offering extreme and diverse terrain, Crested Butte has abundant green and blue groomed trails in addition to more advanced longer trails and the famous extreme limits of the North Face and Headwall.

In 1991, another t-bar was constructed, the High Lift, to access to the Headwall chutes above Paradise Bowl. It also opened additional expert terrain on the upper part of the mountain.

In 1992, Crested Butte entered the high speed lift market, replacing the Silver Queen bubble double with a high speed quad. Two years later, the Paradise double was replaced with another high speed quad. In 1997, the Keystone triple was replaced with a high speed quad, and the original triple was relocated to the East River area.

In 2004, the Keystone Express lift was renamed the Red Lady Express, while the North Face platter was replaced with a t-bar. A fixed-grip quad was also constructed in the Painter Boy area to open up new terrain in the area east of Gold Link. In 2005, another fixed-grip quad, West Wall, replaced the t-bar on Buckley. In 2006, a high speed quad replaced the East River triple chairlift.

GOOD STUFF for the kids & grandkids

Summer is here... water, sun and fun!.

While childhood memories are often filled with carefree days, emergency room doctors know it as "trauma season." Tragedies peak during the warmer months because children are supervised less, have more free time and engage in more outdoor activities.

Water Safety Tips for Kids—

- If you do not know how to swim, always wear a life jacket.
 - If you fall, get pushed in or accidentally get near deep water, a life jacket can keep you floating on the surface until you can get help. Even strong swimmers should wear a vest in deep or rough water.
- Swim with a buddy.
 You've probably heard this many times, but it's worth saying again. If you get into trouble, your friend can get help fast.
- Always go feet first into unfamiliar water.

There could be rocks or tree stumps in rivers and lakes. Even pools can be more shallow than they look. So always check out the depth of water before you dive in.

- If you see someone in trouble, signal the lifeguard or responsible adult.
 - Don't try to rescue the person yourself you could get pulled under the water. Wave your hands over your head to signal the lifeguard or another adult.
- Don't EVER pretend you are drowning.
 It wastes lifeguard's time and may take their attention away from someone who really needs help.
- It's a good idea to stay near people who know you and will notice if you are in trouble.
 - If you are with a group of people, have a check-in time and place to meet. Be sure you show up on time so you won't give the adults gray hairs.
- Don't let your friends tease you into something you don't want to do.
 Even if all your friends are jumping
- in, don't do it if you are afraid or feel like you can't handle it. Knowing your limitations is nothing to be embarrassed about.
- Make sure you always follow the adult in charge's instructions!
- Wear sunscreen!

ONLINE SAFETY for kids

Kids, here's are some Safety Tips for you when you go online.

- Don't ever give out information about yourself like your last name, your phone number, where you live, or where you go to school.
- Never e-mail a picture of yourself to strangers.
- If somebody emails something to you that makes you uncomfortable, don't look around or explore. Tell your parents.
- Making plans to meet your internet buddies in real life is a really bad idea. People in real life can be very different from how they are online.
- Don't open up e-mails, files, or web pages that you get from people you don't know or trust.
- Don't ever give out your password, except to responsible adults in your family.
- Always follow your family's rules for the using the internet.
- Don't ever do anything that costs money. ◆




