Double Super Halfpipe



Some of the world's best snowboarders will descend on Aspen March 19-23, 2014 to try their hand on a halfpipe—or two—that is unlike anything done before. For this Red Bull Signature Series event, two competition-spec halfpipes will be constructed side-by-side, complete with rails, wall rides, channels and other unique features.

The Red Bull Double Pipe contest will air on NBC, Saturday Apr. 12 as part of the Red Bull Signature Series. The event will be free and open to the public.

New Resort for Utah

A new resort in Cache County, Utah, (close to Logan) is set to open its doors next season, bringing the state's total to 15 mountain resorts.

Called Cherry Peak Ski Resort, the small 200-acre resort will position itself as a teaching mountain. The resort will feature three lifts, a small lodge and a parking lot for 300 cars.

The base lies at 5,800 feet and the area receives 322 inches of snow annually, but snowmaking will still be installed.

Vail Removes Pot Shacks

Despite the legalization of private use of marijuana in Colorado, public use of pot remains illegal. And so, over the past several weeks, Vail Resorts (VR) and the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) have destroyed a number of structures associated with prohibited marijuana use.

The structures had been constructed illegally on USFS lands within the permitted boundaries of the company's

four Colorado resorts—Vail, Beaver Creek, Breckenridge and Keystone.

Wolf Mountain's New Owner



Another local's area is getting a new lease on life: Skyline Mountain Base, an investment group comprised of local and European investors, has acquired the Wolf Mountain ski resort from America First Credit Union.

Wolf Mountain fell into bankruptcy in 2010, and parts of the property were sold at auction. The resort itself did not sell, but eventually emerged from bankruptcy thanks to America First.

Skyline plans no immediate changes to the resort, other than expanding the operating hours, and opening on Sundays.

2012-13 was a surprisingly **GOOD YEAR**

Despite late and so-so snowfall and average visitation, U.S. winter resorts posted a record level of operating profit in 2012-13, and their second-highest gross revenue.

The final estimate of 56.9 million visits was up 11.7%. The bottom line is all positive.

The report, prepared by RRC Assocs. and the National Ski Areas Assn., was based on data from 112 resorts. ◆

Beaver to Install Hybrid



Beaver Creek is replacing its primary express quad from the base area with a new high-speed combination chairlift and gondola.

The new lift will increase uphill capacity by as much as 35 percent through the use of alternating 10-passenger gondola cabins and six-person chairs.

The new lift is expected to be in place for the 2014-15 ski and snowboard season, during which Beaver Creek will host the 2015 World Alpine Ski Championships.

Lawsuit Against Alta

Wasatch Equality, a Utah nonprofit corporation, and four individual snowboarders filed a lawsuit in the United States District Court for the District of Utah against Alta Ski Area and the United States Forest Service, seeking to permanently enjoin Alta from enforcing its anti-snowboarder policy and snowboarding ban.

The plaintiffs also seek a declaration from the Court that Alta's snowboarding prohibition, as enforced by the Forest Service, violates the Fourteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution and is therefore unlawful.

| Michael Schumacher



Muscle atrophy is reportedly taking a significant toll on Formula One racer **Michael Schumacher**, who's been in an artificial coma for 12 weeks after suffering an accident while skiing offpiste at Meribel on December 29, 2013.

Schumacher, 44, was skiing in unmarked, advanced terrain above treeline when he fell heavily, hitting his head on a rock and splitting his helmet.

Authorities have credited the helmet for preventing immediate death, but his prognosis is unknown. He suffered extensive brain injuries, but doctors have withheld any definitive word on his condition.

His medical team at the University of Grenoble has slowly been reducing the drugs that have kept him unconscious since immediately after the accident.

Patroller Dies in Avalanche

On Tuesday, March 4, 2014, Wolf Creek Ski Area avalanche technician and senior patroller **Colin Sutton** was caught in an avalanche while conducting an exploration and research mission via helicopter on Conejos Peak in Southwest Colorado.

The avalanche occurred at about 1:30 p.m. He was immediately dug out by his partner and two other emergency personnel, then airlifted by a Medevac helicopter to the emergency room at Mercy Regional Hospital in Durango, Colo., where he was pronounced dead at 4:30 p.m.

x-games **ASPEN**



Aspen Gets 5 X Games

Aspen Skiing Company (ASC) and ESPN have reached an agreement that will have the X Games calling Aspen/Snowmass its home until 2019.

Now in its 13th year, ESPN chose to continue its long-term partnership with ASC, already the longest-tenured X Games host.

ASC was ultimately chosen over seven other bids that were submitted over the last 18 months, including Park City, Utah and Squaw Valley and Heavenly in California. Squaw Valley and Heavenly even submitted a joint bid that would have separated X Games events into two venues.

Last month ESPN announced it would not continue the X Games events in Barcelona, Munich, Foz do Iguaçu, Brazil and Tignes, France.

ESPN's X Games showcased over 200 athletes from around the world in Aspen from January 24-26, 2014.

Competitors battled for medals and prizes in the sports of Snowboard, Ski and Snowmobile. Snowboarder X and Snowmobile Long Jump will return to the X Games Aspen list of disciplines in 2014 after a brief hiatus.

getting & staying FIT

staying in shape for the **SLOPES**

A couple of circuits of strength exercises, combined with a 15-20 minute aerobic workout two or three times a week and you'll be powering down the slope like never before.

Spending a full day on the slopes can be tiring even for the fittest individual. Can't imagine how bad someone would feel if they weren't in shape.

To ensure total strength and fitness in your legs, a combination of **strength** & **endurance training** and **cardio exercises** is recommended.

The strength training should cover all the major muscles of the lower body, hamstrings (back of thighs), quads (front of thighs), glutes (butt muscles) and calves.

And for obvious reasons, any exercise that challenges your balance would be beneficial not only for strength but for keeping you on your feet on the slope!

STRENGTH & ENDURANCE

training

Either use the machines in the gym or do sit-ups and press-ups at home. For boarders who take a lot of hits strong shoulders are important. Here are some simple exercises to do at home.

Wall Squats

Start by standing 12"- 18" from a wall with feet shoulder-width apart, then lean back fully on to the wall, now slowly move your butt towards the floor until your knees are at right angles.

If your feet are closer to the wall than your knees, slowly move them so they are in-line. Maintain this position as long as you can. Time yourself, then add an extra 10 seconds each time you do it.

Lunges

Start with your feet together then take a large step forward with one leg and bend down so the front leg forms a right angle and the back knee almost touches the floor. Make sure you keep your back

straight the whole time.

Then go back up and switch legs. Lunges can be done for 20 repetitions followed by a rest. Repeat the procedure four times.



Core strength - stomach, back and sides - is also a key area, especially for beginners or snowboarders who fall over a lot and use this muscle group to get back up.

CARDIOVASCULAR exercise

Any way you can improve your cardiovascular system will help to improve your skiing stamina.

- If you're not a gym junkie, even going for a fast walk will give you a fair cardiovascular work out.
- Walk upstairs instead of catching elevators. Walk up escalators instead of standing still.

- Try whenever possible to get yourself a little out of breath.
- Little and often is better than a long run once a week.
- Cycling, running, rowing or stepping for 20 minutes three times a week will provide a solid base.
- Hitting the treadmill pays huge benefits on the slopes.

STRETCHING

Increased flexibility helps prevent injuries allowing your body to cope more easily with the strange twists which happen from time to time on skis. It also helps to prevent soreness and stiffness during and after skiing. Calf stretching is very important, particularly for beginners. Hamstrings stretches and quad stretches are also vital.

A little stretch every time you do some exercise will increase your flexibility, and you will be glad of it if you have a spectacular wipeout.

Ski technique needs to be learnt but you'll improve much quicker if you have good balance and coordination.

These assets can also help better skiers stay on their feet and recover from a potential wipeout at speed. ◆

avalanche **SAFETY**

be **PREPARED**

mentally physically equipment-wise

Spring brings conditions that are often ideal for an avalanche. The weight of the melting snowpack becomes heavier until reaching the point where the underlying snow is no longer able to support it and lets loose.

February 19, 2012 there was an fatal avalanche in the backcountry of Stevens Pass. All of the people in the group were experienced backcountry skiers, carrying avalanche rescue gear, and skiing the line in sections, one by one, in accordance with standard safety protocol. Four skiers were caught up in the slide. The only survivor, Elyse Saugstad, credits the ABS Airbag she was wearing for saving her life.

The ABS Airbag

For more than 25 years ABS Peter Aschauer GmbH have been dedicated to the prevention of avalanche snow burial by developing airbags for skiers and snowboarders.



The ABS Airbag has rescued over 200 victims during 100 documented reallife scenarios from snow burial. In other words it works.

The most common cause of death in an avalanche is not the injury sustained when the skier or snowboarder is hit by an avalanche but the burial. 90% of cases of death are a result of suffocation and / or due to the enormous pressure of the snow.

Statistically chances of survival drop markedly after 15 minutes. 50% of avalanche victims who are buried are found dead despite the use of transceivers.

The average depth of burial in an avalanche without the ABS Airbag is just over 3 feet. To dig someone out from under 3 feet of snow, there is 71 cubic feet of dense snowpack to be moved. very hard to do within 10 minutes. Keep in mind that probing can alone take 15 minutes.

ABS Activated

A deployed airbag can keep the victim of an avalanche close to or above the surface.



When a skier or boarder pulls the activation handle, this releases pressure that causes a pin to pierce each gas cartridge. The gas then fills the airbags, with suction and release valves taking in air from the surroundings to aid inflation.

It takes just two seconds to inflate both airbags to a total capacity of 170 liters (6 cubic feet). Used canisters can be refilled by ABS for a small charge.

ABS Statistics

Since 1990, the Swiss Federal Institute for Snow and Avalanche Research (SLF) has documented Avalanche Accidents when an ABS airbag was used.

- Of 106 documented cases, 105 people survived.
- Of the 105 people that survived, 90% were not even buried or only partially buried.
- Of the 10% of those completely buried, they were buried so close to the surface that they were easy to locate.
- Statistical Analysis by the International Committee for Alpine Rescue (ICAR) has shown that survival in an avalanche will increase by 98% with the use of an airbag. •

GOOD STUFF for the kids & grandkids

A child's helmet should fit firmly and should not be bought to grow into.

Kids ski helmets

If you are thinking about taking your family skiing next winter and you have children, remember the importance of kids ski helmets. Ski helmets are one of the most important pieces of equipment needed for a skiing trip; they can help keep a fun vacation from turning tragic. Even if your child is on the beginner slopes and skis super slow, a helmet is a must. It is important when shopping for the helmet that you get a ski helmet, not a bike helmet or any other sporting helmet.

When choosing the helmet, go to a shop that can help you with sizing,they will know how it should fit and show you how to properly wear the helmet. You want to get one that fits just right and does not disrupt your child's vision or make it hard for him to hear what

is going on around him. The helmet should be comfortable, lightweight and warm. The helmets come in many colors and styles so your child is sure to find something that will be cool enough for them to wear without complaining, or at least without too much complaining. Kids ski helmets will give you piece of mind so you can relax and enjoy the trip along with the kids.

Helmets should fit firmly; this is not an item that you want your kid to grow into.

How to Fit a Kids Helmet

By now, most skiers and snowboarders are well aware of the safety benefits of wearing a ski helmet. Not only do they keep the head safe, on cold days they provide more warmth than even the warmest hat.

Just remember that an ill-fitting helmet is the equivalent of not wearing any helmet at all. Here are some important guidelines to follow when fitting a kid's ski helmet.

- Measure it. Start by wrapping a measuring tape around your child's head. The helmet should overlap the tape.
- Try it On. First, align the rim of the helmet with your child's eyebrows.
 While holding the straps on both sides, roll the helmet to the back of

your kid's head.

- 3. Watch the Gaps. You will want to make sure that the pads of the helmet are flush against your child's cheeks and forehead. Make certain that the back of the helmet is not touching his or her neck.
- Give it a Roll. Have your child roll his or her head as if they were trying to dislodge the helmet. The helmet should stay on if the fit is correct.
- 5. **Goggle test.** Make sure that your child's goggles fit with the helmet. There should be no gap between the top of the goggles and the rim of the helmet.
- 6. **Let it Breathe.** Many helmets now come with a ventilation system. This prevents overheating.

To make wearing a helmet fun, consider some of the helmet cover designed by Helmet Headz. (www.headztrong.com/)

Helmet covers come in various styles, including animals and princesses, and have an added benefit that it's impossible to miss your kids if they are wearing one of these.

resorts begin advance **SEASON PASS SALES**

Many of these prices are for a limited time.

Flush from a powder-filled winter this season, a number of resorts in the Colorado Rockies are rewarding forward thinkers with deals on season passes for 2014-2015.

There are also passes available for Californians hoping for a better year.

All pre-season deals come with limitedtime expiration dates, and some have blackout dates.

Sugar Bowl Pass



Sugar Bowl Resort has partnered with Squaw Valley and Alpine Meadows to give Sugar Bowl season passholders skiing & riding privileges at Squaw Valley and Alpine Meadows for the 2014/15 season. The partnership gives season passholders access to 7,650 acres, 55 lifts and more than 370 ski runs in Tahoe, covering some of North America's most challenging & diverse terrain. For details go to http://www.sugarbowl.com/passholder-benefits.

Intrawest Pass

Intrawest has rolled out a new pass product designed for the "modern" family. Called the Intrawest Passport, the pass will offer children 12 and under free skiing and riding.

The season pass includes six days of skiing at each of six participating North American ski resorts during the 2014-15 season— Steamboat Springs and Winter Park, Colo.; Blue Mountain, Ont.; Mont Tremblant, Que.; Stratton Mountain, Vt.; and Snowshoe, W.V.

The Intrawest Passport's introductory price is being offered on a sliding scale, with the primary adult Passport initially offered at \$549, additional adults at \$399, 13- to 20-year-olds at \$199, and children 12 and under are free. There are no blackout dates.

Eldora

An adult pass with no restrictions costs \$399, while the Super Pass (\$269) and Off-Peak Pass (\$339) come with blackout dates. All permit free skiing and riding for the rest of this season, but the resort says prices are subject to change at any time. According to a recent announcement, Eldora will not participate in Vail Resorts' Epic Pass program next season.



The Epic Pass, all-season skiing and riding at Vail, Beaver Creek, Breckenridge, Keystone and Arapahoe Basin, is now being sold. Unlimited skiing, with no blackouts, goes for \$729. Pass is also good for five days at any other Vail Resorts mountain and includes buddy and friend lift ticket discounts.

Epic Passholders will receive five complimentary consecutive days at Niseko, Japan, for the 2014-2015 winter season. Other destinations have not been negotiated of this printing.

The Local Pass is good for Breckenridge, Keystone and Arapahoe Basin for \$549, plus 10 days at Vail and/or Beaver Creek and at Heavenly, Northstar, Kirkwood and Canyons with restrictions. Sale ends April 14.



Mountain Collective

Priced at \$359, you get 2 days at each of the Collective destinations— Alta/ Snowbird, Aspen/Snowmass, Jackson Hole, Mammoth, Squaw Valley/Alpine Meadows and Whistler Blackcomb. Additional days are only 50% with no blackouts. Additional benefits include 2 days in Thredbo, Australia and 2 days in Valle Nevado, Chile. Receive 1 more day at one of the Collective destinations when you purchase today.

Copper Mountain

The new Copper Pass costs \$389 for unlimited skiing and riding. For \$489, the Copper Secret gets you express lift line and pre-opening access.

Rocky Mountain Super Pass

On sale through April 14. For \$439, an adult skier or riders gets unlimited runs at Copper and Winter Park – plus six days at Steamboat and three at Crested Butte. Price goes up to \$509 on April 15.

Steamboat

The resort just unveiled their 2014-2015 pre-season deals, with adult unlimited going for \$999 — and one child gets a free pass. Sale runs through June 2, and includes \$250 in Intrawest bucks and a \$59 add-on for a season of night skiing.

Powderhorn

Through April 20, adult season pass is \$410, with no blackouts. Midweek adult pass is \$325 for Monday-Friday skiing or riding, with some blackouts. Family pass costs \$369.

SUBSTAINABILITY is paying off

more than 75% of US ski resorts have some kind of sustainability program

The National Ski Areas Association (NSAA) today released its Sustainable Slopes Annual Report detailing the ski industry's progress in implementing the principles of its Environmental Charter during the 2012-13 season.

Among the Highlights

115 ski areas endorsed the Climate Declaration. The Declaration calls upon federal policy makers to take action to address climate change, and states that addressing climate change is one of the greatest economic opportunities of the 21st century.

The Climate Challenge Program asks for resorts to inventory, target and reduce their greenhouse gas emissions (GHGs).

Participating resorts include Alta Ski Area, Arapahoe Basin, Boreal Mountain Resort, Canyons Resort, Copper, Grand Targhee, Jackson Hole Mountain Resort, Las Vegas Ski & Snowboard Resort, Mount Hood Meadows Ski Resort, Mt. Bachelor, Park City Mountain Resort and Telluride Ski & Golf Resort.



Overall, these areas reported approximately 115,000 MTCO2e of emissions in 2012; by 2020, they are committed to reducing emissions by at least 38,500 MTCO2e—about 34 percent.

The report also highlights the latest environmental projects and programs

at ski areas across the country including lighting improvements, electric vehicle use, composting, local purchasing programs, water conservation efforts, and employee and guest education as it relates to sustainability.

More than 190 resorts now endorse the association's Environmental Charter, and those resorts represent about 75 percent of the ski industry's annual skier and snowboarder visits.

The report also notes that to further environmental goals, the 2014 NSAA Winter Conferences in Steamboat, Colo., and Mount Snow Vt., will feature a two-day environmental education track.

I caught much of the Paralympic ski action on TV. It was absolutely amazing to see what these athletes were able to accomplish.

There are only 5 categories of games— Alpine Skiing, Biathlon, Cross Country Skiing, Ice Sledge Hockey and Wheel chair Curling. Alpine skiing has three sub-categories— blind, standing, siting.

Host Russia finished strong with 80 medals (a record) and 30 golds. The next highest nation was Ukraine with 25 medals and nine golds. The U.S. (in third) totaled 18 medals (its most at a Winter Games since 2002) and two golds.

Additionally, Russian skier Roman Petushkov won the most individual gold medals in Winter Paralympic history, with six golds across skiing and biathlon events.

PARK CITY turns 50

Skier's Subway carried skiers as if they were miners.

Trams used for hauling ore were converted to chairlifts.

Early Park City miners used what were called "longboard snowshoes" as early as the 1880s for transportation to the mines, but by the 1920s, skiing was becoming a recreational sport.

Scandinavian miners built a jump on the Creole Mine dump, (now the Creole ski run to the Town Lift), and held jumping tournaments. Park City's young adults formed the Park City Ski Club and guided kids and adults on ski tours on the hills that one day would become Park City Mountain Resort.

Treasure Mountain

The present resort was opened on December 21, 1963 as Treasure Mountain by United Park City Mines. This company was the last surviving mining corporation in Park City, and the resort was opened with funds from a federal government program meant to revive the economically depressed town.

Mine company officials urged the towns people to hang on to their real estate because, they said, "it will be valuable some day." At the time, a town lot and house were worth about \$500.

When it originally opened, Treasure Mountain boasted the longest gondola in the United States, as well as a double chairlift, a J-bar lift, base and summit lodges, and a nine-hole golf course. The gondola was a four passenger Polig-Heckel-Bleichert (PHB, a German aerial ropeway company). Its sister lift was built at Sugarloaf/USA in Carrabassett Valley, Maine, after top members of Sugarloaf's management visited Park City's lift.

A special Skier's Subway was used to transport skiers nearly 2.5 miles into the mountain through the pitch-black Spiro Tunnel on a mine train.

The Skier's Subway carried skiers like they were silver miners. Skiers climbed into modified mining trolleys and were pulled to the Thaynes Hoist, where they boarded the old mine elevator and were lifted 1,750 feet to the surface near the Thaynes chair lift.

From there skiers could access the whole mountain. No other ski lift was like it in the world, but it ran just four winters. Although skiers thought it was memorable, they also found it slow, and some thought it was too creepy!

Aerial trams once used for hauling ore were converted into chairlifts. To this day, there are still more than 1,000 miles of old silver-mine workings and tunnels beneath the slopes at Park City Mountain Resort and its neighboring resort, Deer Valley.

Park City Mountain Resort

Treasure Mountain's name was changed

to the Park City Ski Area for its fourth season of 1966-67, and in 1996, became known as the Park City Mountain Resort. The resort has grown to include eight peaks and nine bowls, with 3,300 acres of skiing and 16 chairlifts. The resort has also developed summer activities including an alpine slide, alpine coaster, zip-lines, and several hiking and biking trails.

A sister ski area, known as Park City West (renamed Wolf Mountain and now known as Canyons Resort) opened in 1968, and Deer Valley Resort opened in December 1981, at the site of the former Snow Park (1946–69).

2002 Winter Olympics

During the 2002 games, the resort hosted the men's and women's giant slalom, men's and women's snowboarding parallel giant slalom, and both men's and women's snowboarding halfpipe events.

The resort's Eagle Race Arena and Eagle Superpipe were used as the Olympics runs. Temporary stadiums were erected at the end of each run with spectator standing areas on each side, creating a combined capacity of 16,500 persons.

During the games, 96 percent of the resort was open to normal seasonal operations, making it the only venue to allow spectators to leave and reenter.

2014 hall of fame **HONOREES**

Six Athletes & Sport Builders have been elected to the US Ski/Snowboard Hall of Fame.

They will be inducted at a ceremony to be held in Park City, on April 5, 2014.

These 2014 Hall of Fame inductees represent an extraordinary cross section of athletes and sport builders who have contributed at the highest level to snow sports.



Aspen native **John Clendenin** was one of the early pioneers of freestyle skiing. He founded the International Freestyle Skiers Association in 1973 and won World Championship titles in 1973 and 1974. Clendenin appeared in a host of ski films from noted producers Dick Barrymore, Joe Jay Jalbert and Greg Stump, developed the Clendenin Ski Method and authored "Four Words for Great Skiing."

Toby Dawson was orphaned in Korea, then raised by parents in Vail where he discovered mogul skiing. He reached the pinnacle of his career by taking the World Championship in 2005 and Olympic bronze a year later. He remains a global leader in the sport, introducing his birth nation to mogul skiing and serving a key role with the 2018 Olympics in PyeongChang.




Kris "Fuzz" Feddersen has impacted freestyle skiing as an athlete, coach and business leader. In 14 years as an aerialist on the U.S. Freestyle Ski Team, Feddersen amassed 23 podiums. As a coach, he played a key role in the gold medal sweep of U.S. aerialists at the 1998 Olympics in Nagano. As a co-founder of Flying Ace Productions, he has brought the excitement of action sports to tens of thousands worldwide.



Joe Jay Jalbert began his film career as a production assistant and ski double for Robert Redford in the 1969 classic film "Downhill Racer." From industry product launches to television specials, the Emmy award winning producer has over 800 productions to his credit, including four official Olympic and 14 FIS World Championship films. Jay was presented the FWSA Warren Miller Award in 2005.



Twenty-five years after breaking onto the scene, **Scot Schmidt** remains one of the most recognized and filmed skiers in the world, having appeared in more than 40 films. Schmidt pioneered a style that inspired generations of adrenaline-sport athletes and made "extreme" a household word. His impact in the 1980s set the stage for dramatic changes in the sport.



The late **Jerry Simon** enjoyed a career that touched almost every corner of the sport. From his start in 1964 with Harry Leonard's ski shows through pioneering the Skiing Mechanics and Managers Workshop, from producing the SkiGroup resort marketing shows to creating the International Ski Film Festival, Simon served the industry and the public alike. Jerry received the FWSA Snowsports Builder Award in 2008.







aaron KARITIS



On Saturday March 15, 2014, 31-yearold Aaron Karitis was caught in an avalanche near the Kicking Horse Valley west of Haines, Alaska while heli-ski guiding for Southeast Alaska Backcountry Adventures. Aaron survived his injuries until late Monday night.

Ironically, Aaron was scheduled to speak at the Far West Ski Convention on avalanches.

Aaron, a native of Bend, Oregon and owner/founder of Pulseline Adventure, loved and respected the mountains of Alaska with every fiber of his being.

With an impeccable safety record and extensive avalanche education, Aaron always aired on the side of caution. On Saturday, his conduct put the safety of his clients first.

Aaron dug a snow pit that indicated snow conditions were safe to ski on. (This very snow pit has since been evaluated, confirming Aaron's original assessment as accurate.)

He ski cut the top of the slope to further investigate stability. This ski cut produced no results, also indicating that snow conditions were presumably safe.

Aaron told his group that he would ski down slope. As Aaron skied, a large avalanche was triggered mid slope, carrying him approximately 700 feet down the slope.

Fellow guides located Aaron (who was wearing a beacon) and extracted from four feet of snow within 15 minutes. Resuscitation efforts began immediately. He was air lifted to Haines and then transported to Anchorage.

Aaron's youth, strength, and excellent health will soon help to save more lives through organ donations.

RIP Aaron, you will be missed. •
